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THE EASIEST SHEET PAN MEAL!

Picture this: it's one of those crazy days, and you need to have dinner on the table for the family. You're exhausted, in no mood to cook, but you want a healthy, easy-toprepare dinner. With a quick run to the store for two (yes, two)

Salmon fillets (about 5-6 oz. each) Salt and pepper Fresh broccoli florets

ingredients, that

meal is possible, and very doable.

1. Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Line a sheet pan with foil. (If the salmon is skinless, spray foil with nonstick spray).

- 2. Cut broccoli florets into pieces just larger than bite size. Place on one side of sheet pan; spray with nonstick spray and season with salt and pepper.
- 3. Place salmon on other side of sheet pan. Season with salt and pepper.
- 4. Roast in preheated oven for 10 minutes, or until salmon is cooked to your preference.

5. Remove pan from oven. Lift salmon with a spatula; if it has skin, the skin should remain on the foil.
6. Serve.

A good rule for fish is to measure at the thickest part and cook 10 minutes per inch of thickness.

You could make a quick green salad while the salmon is roasting. I cook this meal at least once a week. It's

easy, healthy, and so delicious!

Switch the veggie... for instance, halved Brussels sprouts. As these take longer to cook, put them in the oven about 10 minutes before the salmon. Remove the pan, add the salmon and place back in the oven to finish. So many variations!

Oklahoma is OK, so the old license plates used to say. Not great, or awesome, just OK. I always admired that low-key

state boast. But after a recent sojourn to Oklahoma City to see the terrific Ed Ruscha retrospective at the spanking new OK Contemporary, I'm going to just go with awesome. The revitalized downtown is bustling with new boutique hotels, hip restaurants, and cool bars. Who knew? Back to the Ed Ruscha show. There is a famous Ruscha piece titled, "I don't want no Retrospective!" Well, hometown hero got

good many early works are included, some that first exhibited at the famous Ferus Gallery in the sixties, the halcyon days of California redux, legendary for launching a modernist West Coast art movement. CAFÉ MODERN REOPENS AT LAST!

Who doesn't have a fond memory of sitting in Café Modern, gazing over the reflecting pool. Tadao Ando's architectural masterpiece, makes it hard to distinguish whether you are inside or outside, floating or stationary. It is a wonderful backdrop for fine dining

and afternoon cocktails. So, when the beloved eatery was



closed indefinitely during the height of quarantine, I

forlornly wondered if and when it would ever reopen. Nestled inside The Modern Museum of Art amidst remarkable works from all over the world, it seems fitting that Wolfgang Puck's Catering company would come to breathe new life, and true culinary artistry into this Fort Worth staple.



freshness and light remains. But there is a new warmth something of the California sun, perhaps? - that he, a Filipino-American California native, seems to have brought with him. I was seated at a perfectly placed table - service was quick to seat me and attentive and Chef Mora came out shortly, eager to welcome and share his enthusiasm for his new home (both the restaurant and Fort Worth). "It's great here. We love it. I live locally in the River District - off White Settlement, so I am in the neighborhood too," he smiled, as he prepared to introduce my appetizer, a trio of mostly local Texas cheeses served with in-house made pickles (watermelon rind, onion, cornichons), marinated olives, and bread. A Barrel-aged feta was a favorite, but the Mobay Sheep Cheddar and Bosque Blue, the latter from Dublin, TX, paired beautifully with the scratch-made fig preserves and fit perfectly in the "farm to table" ethos Chef Mora brings to Café, working with local Texas suppliers as

much as possible. Throughout his career, and in preparing to run Café Modern, Mora worked closely with celebrated Chefs Andrew Swanson and Eric Klein, and continues to be inspired by



I walked into a familiar dining room. In the hands of Chef Jett Mora, the same buzz of sophistication, mentorship from celebrated Chef Matt Bencivenga who passed in 2016. The Wolfgang Puck approach, he shared, is to waste nothing and work with local, seasonal ingredients - creating a menu that will feel familiar to Puck fans, but be firmly rooted in the best of Texas ingredients.

A perfect example of this is the "Charred Kalbi Beef Bowl," a Korean-inspired dish, it includes housemade Kimchi and carrot pickles, medium-rare flank steak, chili garlic rice and is topped with a beautiful fried egg from local Texas Timberview Farms - a provider Chef Mora sought out and met at the Clearfork Farmer's market. Chef urged me to mix all the components, including a good helping of the gochujang sauce (a deliciously savory fermented Korean chili sauce), and eat them together; "That's how we eat it in L.A., in Koreatown, where I used to go," he shared. It was a small piece of Cali with Texas touches. I was lucky enough to be there on a Friday when Chef Mora had

prepared a special dish for the Friday Happy Hour at the Modern (which is back by the way!) - and he let us try it ahead of its debut. It was the perfect summer dish: a Mexican-style lime-marinated Mahi Mahi ceviche tostada with a "first of the season burnt peach," habanero and fresno chiles. "I know you get great peaches here in Texas, so I am working with Farm to Table Texas to source the best Texas has to offer," shared Chef. I would have gone home happy having eaten just that - but then he brought another highlight: the classic Wolfgang Puck "Chinois Chicken Salad" developed at Puck's long-celebrated restaurant Chinois on Main. Delicately poached chicken is paired with Nappa Cabbage, radicchio (my favorite, a highly underrated ingredient), and candied cashews, tossed lightly in a bright, and yet earthy, ginger-sesame dressing and topped with fried wontons. Crunchy, sweet, savory, tangy and all the best things come together in what is truly a deliciously memorable chicken salad. We finished lunch with a beautiful red velvet whoopie pie. Despite my love of Maine, I am not a huge fan of whoopie pies - they are so often one-note, and cloyingly sweet, but this one surprised me in the best way: the middle is filled with a mix of fresh macerated berries, creating the perfect ratio of cream cheese icing to fruit to cake. I would reorder it. All of it, really.

As I ate, more than satisfied, I realized that my experience eating at Café Modern was an aesthetic dance of sorts - the ambiance, the effortless service, and the food all came together in a perfectly composed trio that brought artistry into even the smallest detail. That and Chef Mora's enthusiasm, attention to detail, and true love of warm hospitality are why I will be back.

12 MIGHTY ORPHANS PREMIERE



CATCHING RAIN

Wish I could have captured and stored more rainwater while there was so much!!!

For centuries people have diverted, collected and stored rainwater to treat for drinking, bathing, livestock and agriculture irrigation. This practiced stopped in areas where safe drinking water is provided at the turn of the tap. Fort Worth Water Department provides the cleanest safest drinking water at an affordable cost. Landscape irrigation uses this clean safe



drinking water. An inefficient or poorly scheduled irrigation system waste water due to runoff, high pressure, poor or no maintenance and poor irrigation schedule.

Tarrant Regional Water District captures

and stores rainfall in all the lakes they built and maintain. As rainwater runs off our homes and landscapes, rain, now called stormwater, runs into storm drains and into the Trinity River system. The lakes are storage for the drinking water treatment plants. Rainfall is also stored in the ground. Some rainfall will recharge the aquifers.

Water conservation is the least expensive method for future water resources. For years we have been asked to use indoor water as efficiently as possible. Now, we must look at using landscape water as efficiently as possible. In many communities, water use increases by 35 to 45% during the summer. This

increase is landscape irrigation. Rainwater harvesting is an innovative method to capture, divert and store rainwater for irrigation and other practices.

Harvesting rainwater for landscape irrigation will:

- Reduce demand on the municipal water supply
- Save money by reducing water bill
- Make efficient use of a valuable resource
- Reduce flooding, erosion and the contamination of surface water with sediments, fertilizers and pesticides in stormwater runoff

A rainwater collection system could provide all or part of your irrigation requirements and prevent stormwater damage.


Several demonstrations of rainwater collection systems are located at Fort Worth Botanic Garden/BRIT. All water used in the FWBG conservation greenhouse is rainwater from storages tanks on the south side of the greenhouse right off the HWY 30 service road. Tall 5,000 gallon cisterns collect rainwater off the greenhouse roof. Rainwater is pumped into the greenhouse for irrigation. Several rainwater cisterns and rain barrels are located in the Backyard Vegetable Garden. Visit this garden to view the collection, storage and distribution system.

For every square foot of roof, you can collect 0.6 gallons in a one-inch rain. So I can collect 1200 gallons of rain off my 2,000 sqft greenhouse in a one-inch rain. Fort Worth rainfall average pre year in 34 inches. So I have the potential to collect 40,800 gallons.

Rainwater has is chlorine free, salt free, Ph below 7, and is clean if filtered before entering cistern or barrel. Mosquitoes are usually not a problem if barrels use insect netting for filters and cisterns are set up so mosquitoes cannot enter.

PREVENTING HEAT STROKE IN PETS IN THE SUMMER MONTHS

With the summer in full swing, one of the more common concerns in our pets is heat stroke. Heat stroke is an illness that develops when the body temperature rises to dangerous levels. This increased temperature has effects on the entire body—it can cause shock, difficulty breathing, damage to the brain and kidneys, bleeding, and Gl upset. If not treated promptly, and in severe cases, it can be fatal.

It's important to know that heat stroke can occur at any time of the year and to any patient. However, heat stroke is more common in dogs and in the summer months. It can either be classified as exertional (which occurs with exercising during hot and humid weather) or nonexertional (with the classic example being of an animal trapped in a hot car).

What causes heat stroke?

- Heat stroke occurs when the body cannot get rid of excess heat. The heat can be generated by exercise, come from the environment, or created by metabolic conditions (example: prolonged seizure activity).
- Exertional heat stroke can occur when animals are exercising when it is hot or humid. Even a normal walk can turn into a life-threatening emergency. Brachycephalic animals (such as Pugs, Boston Terriers, Bulldogs) are at higher risk of heat stroke as are animals with respiratory diseases like larvngeal paralysis.
- Nonexertional heat stroke occurs when animals are restricted to a confined area with minimal airflow, such as a parked car. The temperature in a parked car- even with the windows open- can rise rapidly. The combination of high temperatures, poor ventilation, and having a fur coat, can cause animals to overheat.

What are signs of heat stroke? Signs of heat stroke can include:

- · Weakness or collapse
- Pale gums
- Noisy or raspy breathing (particularly in brachycephalic dogs)
- Excessive panting, including panting that persists long after ceasing exercise or moving to a cool environment
- Dull or depressed mentation- i.e. if your pet does not respond to you as they normally would

What should I do if I think my animal is experiencing heat stroke?

- Stop any activity that your animal is involved in:
- If outdoors, move indoors to an air-conditioned area, an area with fans, or into an air-conditioned car
- Cool your pet by placing a soaked towel over their body or hosing their body with cool water.
- Do NOT place your animal in a tub or ice bath. Animals that are weak could drown if left unattended. Water that is too cold can actually impair heat loss.
- If your pet is showing the listed signs above AND has been outside in hot or humid weather OR has been confined to a car or other small space, bring them to a veterinarian immediately!

How can I avoid heat stroke?

- Talk to your veterinarian about whether or not your pet is at increased risk of heat stroke.
- Be aware of the temperature, humidity, and air quality when planning outdoor activities or trips with your pet.
- Avoid exercising during the hottest parts of the day; try to plan walks and time outdoors for the early morning and late evening hours. Limit exercise to short periods of time. Alternatively, spend play time indoors in an air-conditioned environment.
- Keep your pet at home when it's hot! As much fun as it is to bring your pet for a car ride, do not bring them on car trips unless they can be kept in an air-conditioned car at all times.

Take away points

- Heat stroke can occur when body temp. rises to dangerous levels.
- Animals are at risk of heat stroke if they are exercising when the weather is hot or humid or if they are confined to a space with poor ventilation.
- Know if your animal has a higher risk of heat stroke (i.e. if you have a brachycephalic dog or a dog with respiratory disease). Know the signs of heat stroke.
- If you think your pet is experiencing heat stroke, stop any activity, cool them, and transport them to a vet immediately.








